Luke 19:28

When He had said this, He went on ahead, going up to Jerusalem.

Coronation

A coronation is the act of placement or bestowal of a crown upon a monarch's head. The term generally also refers not only to the physical crowning but to the whole ceremony wherein the act of crowning occurs, along with the presentation of other items of regalia, marking the formal investiture of a monarch with regal power. Aside from the crowning, a coronation ceremony may comprise many other rituals such as the taking of special vows by the monarch, the investing and presentation of regalia to the monarch, and acts of homage by the new ruler's subjects and the performance of other ritual deeds of special significance to the particular nation. Western-style coronations have often included anointing the monarch with holy oil, or chrism as it is often called; the anointing ritual's religious significance follows examples found in the Bible. The monarch's consort may also be crowned, either simultaneously with the monarch or as a separate event.

Luke 19:29-34

And it came to pass, when He drew near to Bethphage[fn] and Bethany, at the mountain called Olivet, that He sent two of His disciples, saying, "Go into the village opposite you, where as you enter you will find a colt tied, on which no one has ever sat. Loose it and bring it here. "And if anyone asks you, 'Why are you loosing it?' thus you shall say to him, 'Because the Lord has need of it.' "So those who were sent went their way and found it just as He had said to them. But as they were loosing the colt, the owners of it said to them, "Why are you loosing the colt?" And they said, "The Lord has need of him."

And a very great multitude spread their clothes on the road; others cut down branches from the trees and spread *them* on the road.

Took branches of palm trees: la patriotic parade. Palm branches were a symbol of Jewish nationalism since the time of the Maccabees. The crowd looked to Jesus as a political and national savior, but not so much as a spiritual savior.

Luke 19:37-38

Then, as He was now drawing near the descent of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of the disciples began to rejoice and praise God with a loud voice for all the mighty works they had seen, saying: "'Blessed is the King who comes in the name of the LORD!' Peace in heaven and glory in the highest!"

An Amazing Profession

Hallel consists of six Psalms (113–118), which are recited as a unit, on joyous occasions [1] including the three pilgrim festivals mentioned in the Torah, Pesach (Passover), Shavuot, and Sukkot (the "bigger" Jewish holy days), as well as at Hanukkah and Rosh Chodesh (beginning of the new month). Hallel is recited during the evening prayers on the first (and, outside Israel, second) night of Pesach

What is recorded is from Psalm 118 verse 26

Jesus Weeps over Jerusalem

Luke 19:41-44

Now as He drew near, He saw the city and wept over it, saying, "If you had known, even you, especially in this your day, the things *that make* for your peace! But now they are hidden from your eyes. "For days will come upon you when your enemies will build an embankment around you, surround you and close you in on every side, "and level you, and your children within you, to the ground; and they will not leave in you one stone upon another, because you did not know the time of your visitation."

Exact Day of Jesus' Arrival Predicted

• Dan 9:25_"Know therefore and understand, *That* from the going forth of the command To restore and build Jerusalem, Until Messiah the Prince, *There shall be* seven weeks and sixty-two weeks; The street[fn] shall be built again, and the wall, Even in troublesome times.

• **Neh 2:1**_And it came to pass in the month of Nisan, in the twentieth year of King Artaxerxes, *when* wine *was* before him, that I took the wine and gave it to the king. Now I had never been sad in his presence before.

The Prophetic Day Fufilled

Jesus entered into Jerusalem on the exact day prophesied by Daniel. Artaxerxes started the clock and Jesus entered on the exact day predicted.

(Warning So Much Math) Thank you Sir Rober Anderson!

Daniel talks about weeks of years. 69 weeks of years= 483 years

First week of 7 years = 49 Years. Brings you to 445 BC to 396 BC this is when they were building streets and walls in Jerusalem. And the end of the ministry of Malachi, and the closing of the Old Testament Canon.

Next 62 Weeks of years = 434 years. Brings you to April 6, 32 A.D.; the month of Nisan.

7 weeks of years + 62 weeks of years = 483 years x 360 days per year = 173,880 days

483 years of 360 days. Now, the only way we can figure it out is we have to convert into our kind of years, with our kind of days, so we'll just multiply to get how many days it would be. You multiply it out, and it's 173,880 days. You say, "The Bible can't be this specific." Well, you'll find out in a moment - 173,880 days. The decree comes on March 14th, 445 BC. Sir Robert Anderson, who particularly did monumental work on this prophecy of the triumphal entry of Jesus Christ, has identified, by looking at the Jewish calendars of Passovers and so forth, that the time in which Passover was held can be determined rather easily, at least through using his method.

If Daniel is correct, from March 14, 445 B.C., to April 6, 32 A.D., is going to be 173,880 days. From March 14, 445, to April 6, 32 A.D., is only 477 years and 24 days; so we're a few years short. We have to deduct a year, because 1 B.C. and 1 A.D. is the same year, so we really have 476 years and 24 days. Now, we have to convert to our calendar of 365 days, so we multiply that all out, plus 24 days, and we get 173,764; and we're still short. But we have leap year every four years. So, 476 divided by 4, gives us 119 leap years, so we add 119 more days to 173,664, and we get 173,883 days - 3 days too many. You say, "Oh, close is good enough for me." Close is not good enough for God. Sir Robert Anderson went to the Royal Observatory in England, and he found out that, according to their solar calculations, a year is 1/128 of a day longer on the calendar than a solar year; 1/128 of a day longer. So every 128 years, we have to lose a day. And if you're dealing with 483 years, there'll be 3 of those, subtract those 3 days. And you have 173,880 days, just exactly as the Word of God said. (End of Math)

Assuredly, this honor paid to our Lord was passing strange; a gleam of sunlight in a day of clouds, a glimpse of summer-tide in a long and dreary winter. He that was, as a rule, "despised and rejected of men", was for the moment surrounded with the acclaim of the crowd. All men saluted him that day with their Hosannas, and the whole city was moved. It was a gala day for the disciples, and a sort of coronation day for their Lord. (Spurgeon)
